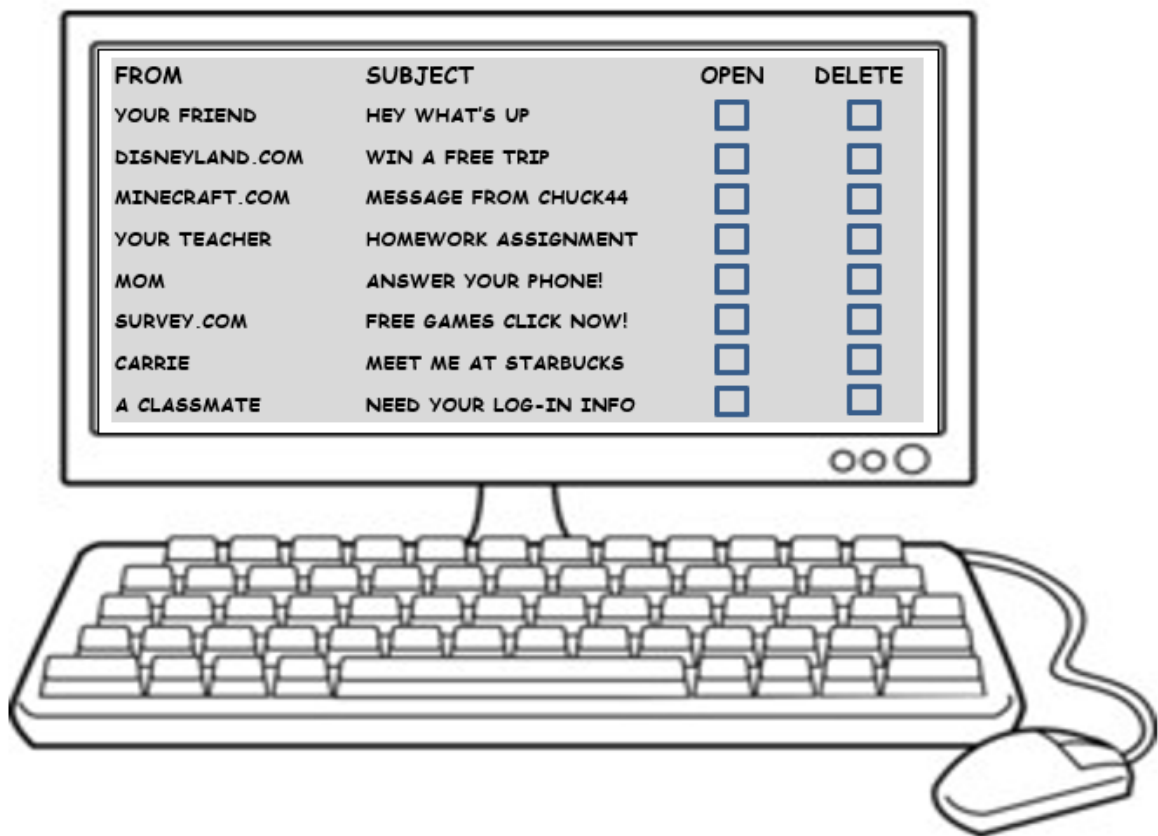


### Activity #1: Emails: What to Open/Delete?

Look at the computer below. There are emails on the computer stating who they are from and the subject. If an email says "your" assume it's someone you know. Read the information and decide which emails to open and which to delete then check the appropriate box.

Discuss with the class the emails they opened and the ones they deleted. Have students explain their responses. Encourage class discussion by having other class members agree or challenge the responses of their classmates.

For each of the pictures below write any personal information you can find.



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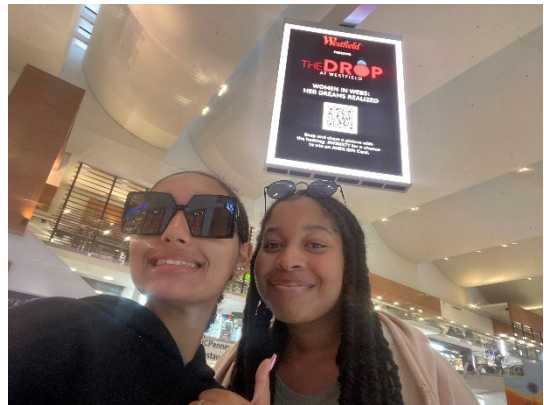
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## Activity #4: Internet Safety Game

(10 minutes)

### Preparation for Internet Safety Bingo:

There are ten templates with two Bingo cards on each sheet. Each template has the answers in a different pattern so be sure to copy all eight templates. It is suggested that you copy them in color. Cut each sheet in half.

### Instructions for playing Internet Safety Bingo:

Distribute an Internet Safety Bingo card to each student

Tell students:

- that you will read sentences that can be answered or completed by the words in the squares on their bingo card.
- to mark an **X** in the squares when they have found the correct answer.
- the first one to get **4** squares horizontally, vertically, or diagonally should raise their hand and say: **"Internet Safety!"**

TEACHER:

- Read Internet Safety Bingo questions. It is important to mix up the questions and not read them in the order that they are written. **Do Not** read the numbers next to the questions, however, circle the number of the questions you read to the students to remember which ones you choose.
- When there is a winner(s) have them read the numbers and answers of their winning squares to you and check them against your answer sheet.
- Continue the game, if time permits, to encourage further student participation and to reinforce the content of the lesson.

# Gaming Safely

Parental involvement is critical when it comes to helping children game more safely. Take an active interest in the games that your child plays and wants to buy. You can research games' ratings and content on **www.esrb.org**. This website is maintained by the Entertainment Software Rating Board which rates thousands of games each year.

**Know** which safety features are available on the gaming equipment that your child uses—a headset may have voice-masking features, for example.

**Keep** gaming consoles in an easy-to-supervise location and be aware of other places where your child may be accessing games.

**Tell** your child never to give out personal information while gaming or agree to meet anyone outside of the game.

**Set rules** about how long your child may play, what types of games are appropriate, and who else may participate.

**Have** your child check with you before using a credit or debit card online.

**Check** to see if the games your child plays have reporting features or moderators.

## Start a discussion with your child

- » Can we play some of your favorite games together?
- » How do you respond if someone bothers you while you are gaming?
- » How much do you let people know about you while gaming?
- » What kinds of people do you game with?
- » Do you feel safe while you are gaming online? Why or why not?
